Maya came to UC Berkeley from the highly regarded University of Hawaii after completing her masters degree and is now leading work out of Bodega Bay Marine Lab. She has done a masterful job completing 3 sets of experiments focused on both adult and juvenile sea urchin life stages contributing to her thesis: conducting scuba based kelp forest monitoring surveys, collections and field experiments.

Brayden is a student in the Biological Sciences masters program at Cal Poly Humboldt and is now beginning graduate thesis research. He received his bachelors degree in biology from SDSU in 2021 and is currently beginning his graduate thesis. He is interested in the application of phycological research to real world problems specifically a study relevant to managing the loss of kelp forests due to warming ocean and increased grazing pressure by purple sea urchins. He has designed a combination of field and laboratory experiments to examine whether acid weed (*Desmarestia ligulate*) can inhibit purple sea urchin grazing.







NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARIES

The Office of National Marine Sanctuaries serves as the trustee for a network of underwater parks encompassing more than 620,000 square miles of marine and Great Lakes waters from Washington state to the Florida Keys, and from Lake Huron to American Samoa. The network includes a system of 16 national marine sanctuaries plus Papahānaumokuākea and Rose Atoll (American Samoa) marine national monuments."

NEW NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY!

Five years after initiating the sanctuary designation process for Lake Ontario and seven years after NOAA received the sanctuary nomination, today is a day to celebrate! HURRAH

It is hard to put into words how much work has gone into this designation. The valued Sanctuary Advisory Council members were key to bringing this to reality. From day one, they connected with community members, provided a vision for this sanctuary and continued to believe. Yes, there is a lot of work ahead to implement the management plan to bring the ideas to reality. It is both the finish line and the starting line. The new Sanctuary is the 16th and covers 40 ship wrecks (18th-19th Century wrecks) and 1 plane.

The Office of National Marine Sanctuaries website will have a new map of the NMS system!

But now the work begins: to designate and buoy the irreplaceable shipwreck resource in the SE Lake Ontario area; to educate the greater New York State area on the resource we hold; to promote eco-tourism on the lake and in shoreline interpretation centers; to discover new resources in our Lake Ontario area and hopefully soon the upper St Lawrence River area.







SEA STARS!

The sunflower sea star, A starfish with up to 24 arms, faces a devastating pandemic from sea star wasting disease. This disease causes the sea stars to develop lesions and eventually dissolve into a jelly-like puddle, leading to their death within days. Since 2013, an estimated

<u>5.75 billion</u> sunflower sea stars have died, and the species was listed as critically endangered in 2020.

Efforts to save them include breeding programs and reintroduction initiatives by researchers from various institutions. Teams are also working to identify the disease's cause and study the genetics of survivors. In the US, University of Washington is leading the research.

From the San Jose Flipper Dipper Dive Skindiving Club Newsletter: The Sunflower Star Laboratory in Moss Landing is currently raising hundreds of juvenile sunflower stars (Pycnopodiahelianthoides) in their aquaculture facility. Check out www.sunflowerstarlab.org to learn more.

The International Union for Conservation of Nature reclassified the species as endangered in 2020, and a petition to list the species under the US federal Endangered Species Act was filed in 2021. Public hearings were held in 2023, and I have not seen an update yet on the progress of this initiative. Stay tuned! MANAGE CALIFORNIA'S MARINE PROTECTED AREA NETWORK

At its February 2024 meeting, the *California Fish and Game Commission* (CFGC) referred 20 petitions with over 80 unique requests to amend marine protected area regulations to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) for review, evaluation, and recommendation.

The Commission has approved a 3-phase approach to evaluate the petitions. The Department has completed Phase 1 of the 3-phase approach and will present the draft to the Commission at the Marine Resources Committee (MRC) meeting July 17, 2024.

Binning is the first step, and the Commission has requested public feedback on the draft proposed binning of petitions. All petitions have been sorted into either Bin 1 (petitions ready to be evaluated in the near-term. Placement in Bin 1 does not guarantee the petition approval or Bin 2 (petitions those require additional policy guidance, information, and/or resources before evaluation).

Feedback on petition binning may be sent directly to the Commission to inform the discussions scheduled for the July 17 MRC meeting. The draft Phase1 document outlining the proposed binning of petitions includes background information on binning criteria, tables outlining the proposed Bin 1 and Bin 2 petitions and justifications for why petitions are categorized into each bin.

It is anticipated the Marine Resources Committee will make a recommendation on the draft proposed binning for consideration at the Commission August meeting. Following the Commission's approval of petition binning, the Department will move forward with the evaluation of Bin 1 petitions for subsequent discussion and consideration by the MRC and the Commission.







VENTURA CNTY POACHING CONVICTIONS:

JAIL TERMS & FINES

A sophisticated conspiracy to commit wildlife violations by seven men resulted in the arrest, prosecution, fines and jail terms for the subjects. Wildlife officers began investigating a group after receiving numerous tips from the public regarding a group of individuals engaged in suspected poaching activities in the southern Los Padres National Forest.

The investigation revealed the co-defendants obtained a highly unusual amount of replacement licenses and hunting tags issued from a CDFW license vendor. The men conspired with a clerk at a market to fraudulently obtain additional tags to exceed big game hunting limits. In total, 87 licenses, tags, or other entitlements were fraudulently obtained.

The long-term investigation occurred in partnership with the Ventura Cnty DA Environmental Protections Unit and resulted in the service of several search warrants. The search warrants resulted in the seizure of numerous taxidermy mounts, deer skulls, a mountain lion skull, a variety of game meat including deer and bear, fraudulent big game tags, 11 firearms, thousands of rounds of ammunition, roosters and cock fighting paraphernalia and stolen copper wire. During the year after the search warrants were served, wildlife officers continued to conduct an extensive investigation leading to the search of a local taxidermy shop resulting the discovery of additional evidence, including an illegally taken bear and a fraudulently acquired bear tag.

The VCDA's Office arranged a plea agreement with all seven co-defendants. The plea agreement stipulating all co-defendants plead guilty to counts of felony conspiracy for the unlawful take/possession of wildlife and for filing false documents with the state. The plea also stipulated the defendants each serve 180 to 220 days in jail, 24 months formal probation and a lifetime prohibition of hunting and fishing privileges in the state of California.

30 x 30 CALIFORNIA Draft Decision Making Framework for Coastal Waters

INTRODUCTION

In October 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-82-20 (1), which advanced biodiversity conservation as an Administration priority and elevated the role of nature in fighting climate change. Part of this Executive Order committed California to conserving 30% of its lands and coastal waters by 2030 (the "30x30" target) – putting California at the leading edge of an international movement to protect nature (1), (2).

In 2022, the California Natural Resources Agency released Pathways to 30x30, which defines 30x30 Conservation Areas and details strategies and opportunities for achieving the initiative's goals. 30x30 will create and expand during conservation measures across a broad range of landscapes and seascapes in California to protect biodiversity, expand access to nature, and mitigate and build resilience to climate change.

Conserving additional 13.8% of coastal waters by 2030 requires action across 4 fronts:

Adaptively managing the state's marine protected area (MPA)network

<u>Strengthening</u> biodiversity conservation in California's federally- managed National Marine Sanctuaries

<u>Supporting tribally-led</u> conservation, including through the creation of Indigenous Marine Stewardship Areas

<u>Exploring the role of other marine managed_areas beyond MPAs_and Sanctuaries in conserving biodiversity</u>

CDFW RELEASES 1 MILLION CHINOOK SALMON INTO

San Pablo Bay from Cal Maritime Campus As the sun set over the San Pablo Bay June 10, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), joined by faculty, staff and students from the California State University Maritime Academy (Cal Maritime), released

approximately 1 million fall-run Chinook salmon smolts from the Cal Maritime campus in Vallejo.

It was the first release of Chinook salmon from this location in almost four decades and among the final releases of hatchery fall-run Chinook salmon taking place in San Francisco and San Pablo bays this spring and summer.
